When they come to us many of our residents have experienced traumatic childhoods, years of chaos and uncertainty and repeated failure of the adults in their lives to provide the love and care they need.

When they arrive at Don Bosco Care they get a new start. They are assured that their past will not dictate their future. That we will not give up on them. That they are valued, loved and are a welcome addition to our homes.

While we have faced ever greater challenges working with the more complex needs of our young people we continued to achieve incredible results and see damaged lives repaired and moving on to a better future. We have seen the launch of our first major fundraising campaigns and have had our spirits lifted by the generous and heartfelt response from supporters.

I would like to thank all our partners, supporters and funders for their generosity and compassion towards the children and young adults in our care and look forward to working with you all in 2016.



Stories of Hope - John

He came to us confused and broken, but things turned around for this troubled teen. John's one of those intimidating teenagers that's built like a fridge and looks like he'd crush you if you

looked at him the wrong way. Or at least, that's the first impression you might get on meeting him. But take the time to talk to him and you quickly discover a gentle giant. John was in one of our residential homes for two and a half years after things at home broke down to the point where it was simply the wrong place for him to be. He came to us as an emotionally volatile lad battling alcoholism – and still only a kid at the time. But where some people would have seen a frightening looking lad with no hope of a future, we saw a hurt teenager with the makings of a wonderful child care worker. You see, not only did John work hard on his own issues, but he quickly became an asset in his home, by playing a kind of 'nurturing' role among his peers. So much so that he has helped us to get through to many other boys.

Stories of Hope - Patrick

Patrick was a tough Dublin lad who came to us from a terrible home life. The sort of thing you wouldn't wish on anyone. By the time he was 19 we'd helped him get past the worst of his demons, but he was drifting. Going nowhere. He'd told us he was desperate to work, but given his home background, had no idea how to go about getting any. It just happened at this time that the home Patrick was living in was getting some repair work done by a plumber. The manager of the home asked the plumber if he'd give Patrick a shot at a couple of days unpaid work experience. Cautiously, the plumber agreed. And Patrick jumped at the opportunity. Two days later the plumber called to tell us that Patrick was such a good worker he'd decided to take him on and pay him properly. "I'm going to give this guy a job," he said. "He doesn't shy away from anything!"

Fundraising in 2015

2015 was an important year for fundraising at Don Bosco Care. Following years of cuts in state funding and an uncertain future should we not secure support from private sources the board approved a multi year fundraising strategy to grow a supporter base of 10,000 individuals.

This was important for a number of reasons:

1. While we have an excellent, long standing partnership with our state funder. It was not prudent to rely solely on state funding and to place the future care of our young people at risk of government and/or policy changes.

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2. Children in the care of the state are really in the care of Irish society as a whole and we felt that it was important to give people who were passionate about children in care the opportunity to support them and play a part in providing their care.
 3. The story of children taken into the care of the state is not well known. They are a hidden group and with that comes stigmatisation. We wanted to share their stories and experiences - while protecting their privacy - with as many people as possible.

Don Bosco Care Golf Classic 2015

We returned to Baltray this summer for our second annual golf classic. We were delighted to have 18 teams taking part, many of whom were returning having enjoyed the inaugural classic so much. The golf classic plays an important part of our fundraising strategy as it gives us a chance to spend time with some of our long standing supporters, while getting the chance to get to know our new ones in an informal and relaxed environment. We are continually amazed at the interest and passion people have for our work.

God Parent Club

Don Bosco Care receives substantial funding from TUSLA, The Child and Family Agency, which ensures that our houses are staffed, heated and our young people well fed. However as any parent can tell you this is not what makes a home. At Don Bosco Care we try to give our young people as many opportunities to grow, learn and discover themselves as possible. This can mean sending them to music lessons, encouraging them to play sport or taking them on short holidays. Regular things that regular children often take for granted but that cost.

In late 2015 we launched our God Parents Club to appeal to supporters who felt like we do that children in our care should not go without just because they are in care. The initial response to the campaign was very positive and we hope it will grow from strength to strength in the coming years.

Christmas Campaign

The main strand of our newly launched fundraising campaign was to use direct marketing to reach as many potential donors as possible. In November 2015 we wrote out to households all over Ireland sharing the story of a young boy who grew up in our care and was encouraging

people to support us. It was the first time the Don Bosco Care had ever done major public fundraising before and we were staggered by the response. Almost 3,000 individuals sent us donations and many included cards and messages of good wishes for the children in our care. It was amazing how touched people were by our story and how willing they were to join with us.

Governance of Don Bosco Care

Don Bosco Care is governed by a voluntary board of directors and managed on a day to day basis by the CEO and Director of Services. We are committed to being fully compliant with Governance Codes for Community, Voluntary and Charitable Organisations, the Statement of Guiding Principles for Fundraising and SORP financial reporting standards by the end of 2016. We are also compliant with the Voluntary Regulation Code for Approved Housing Bodies
